Anderson Free Clinic (AFC) in 2016 ...

- ◆ Electronic Medical Records System at our Fant St site.
- ◆ Established treatment of Hepatitis C on site.
- ◆ Awarded 3-year state re-certification with the South Carolina Free Clinic Association, after careful revision and creation of governance, administrative, clinical personnel and safety policies, protocols and procedures to meet almost two hundred standards.
- ◆ Total # of medical visits in 2016: 3567, held by 34 volunteer physicians, one volunteer NP. and 1 staff Nurse Practitioner, 24 medical students and 35 residents.
- ◆ We welcomed 6 new AFC volunteer physicians committed to help expand clinic capacity.
- ◆ Total number of patients in 2016: 1206. **Of those, 323 are new patients who now have a health care home!**
- ◆ Another class of 3rd year medical students of VCOM and MUSC completed a year long /once a week training at AFC in continuity of care to the underserved. That is part of AFC support to AnMed Health's efforts in expanding medical education opportunities.

We could not do it without our volunteer workforce

Over 75% of Anderson Free Clinic's workforce continues to be composed of volunteers, and we could not operate any different without a much larger operating budget. **In 2016, with total expenses of less than \$600,000, AFC provided an excess of \$4,300,000 in services/resources to patients.**

Prescription Assistance 2016

29,266: Rx dispensed at AFC pharmacy
1012: Mail-in prescription orders received by patients at home, that are processed by AFC to secure continuity.
\$ 144,000: Pharmacy operating expense
\$ 2,600,000: Value of Medication & health good dispensed at AFC Pharmacy.

About our Patients

Care before becoming AFC patient: Most patients have never seen a dentist before becoming a Free Clinic patient.
Disease management needed: Alarming, 81.7% of our patients are overweight or obese; 87% have abnormal blood pressure; over 70% are diabetic.
Health Habits: Many of our patients use tobacco products, consume high-fat food, and are physically inactive.
Social Habits: Many patients do not have private transportation or stable networks of support
Employment: 60-70% of our patients are unemployed or only seasonally employed; 10% work stable part-time jobs; 7-10% work full-time jobs but lack health benefits.
Housing insecurity: 70% - Most patients rent or receive boarding by sharing food stamps, with transient living conditions
Top 3 languages: English, Spanish, Bengali.
